Professor Carolyn Stevens introduces Japanese Rock @ "Japan in Stereo"

The Japan Foundation, Sydney welcomes Professor Carolyn Stevens on Friday, February 22 to introduce Japanese Rock at the Japan in Stereo music listening series.

Carolyn Stevens spent several years in Japan in the 1990s, working as a consultant to an entertainment management agency and rubbing shoulders with some of the nation's **biggest names in rock music**.

In conversation with series presenter **Zacha Rosen**, Professor Stevens charts the path of her encounters with Japanese rock music, **sharing her knowledge**, **experience and music collection** to give a beginner's guide to the genre.

Says Carolyn Stevens, "Japan has a **thriving rock scene** which has evolved from emulating Western music to developing **a style all of its own**. What I'll do is show what makes the Japanese rock of today so **distinctively Japanese**."
