'Tokyo Gardens'

A photographic exhibition by Naoto Ijichi

The Japan Foundation, Sydney presents an exhibition by Japanese photographer Naoto Ijichi, entitled 'Tokyo Gardens' at The Japan Foundation Gallery at Central Park. The exhibition runs from 6 May to 30 May in conjunction with Head On Photo Festival.

'Tokyo Gardens' takes the viewer on a visual tour of Tokyo's gardens captured throughout the four seasons in a collection of colour and black-and-white photographs. The series features 14 gardens spanning 400 years of history, the oldest of which was built in the 17th century.

Visually, **Ijichi** aims to provide a historical perspective by photographing the gardens in a way that **evokes the past**. Through his photography he attempts to travel back as close as possible to the times these gardens were created and **showcase the traditional beauty** within them.

As the cityscape changed, particularly after World War II, Tokyo started losing its distinctive traditional style in favour of a more urban and contemporary aesthetic. The gardens of Tokyo became an increasingly important feature of the metropolis, providing **tranquil** natural spaces and a sense of connection with Japan's **rich tradition**.

Ijichi shares that, "One of my goals in photographing the gardens of Tokyo was to document Japanese cultural attitude towards landscape design. Through a kind of trip into the past, I tried to capture the essence of Japanese aesthetic which we can find within the different gardens."
